CHAIRMAN'S NOTES



Today we welcome Folkestone Invicta back to Champion Hill for the first time in the league since an entertaining 4-3 win in January 2018. Unfortunately, that victory would be our last for two months paving the way for Billericay to claim the title and leaving us to take the (for some, more enjoyable) promotion path via the play offs.

Momentum that season was the key to promotion as either side of that awful spell we put together three unbeaten runs of 13, 9 and 8 games and our inability since then to even come close to the shortest of those runs explains why we find ourselves back here rebuilding. So today is a nervous one for me as for the fifth time since that promotion we have reached five games unbeaten in the league but on each of the four prior occasions we have fallen at the sixth hurdle.

I would love to finally go one better than we have achieved in recent years but the fact that two of those unbeaten runs have now come under Hak in little more than half a

season in charge is the more important sign of the progress I need to see and I feel we are slowly but surely moving closer to our goal of a settled side which is both harder to beat and easier on the eye in equal measure.

Folkestone will be another tough and entertaining match as both sides are finding it easier to hit the back of the net than keep the ball out of it in what continues to be a tough league, it is a sobering fact that as hard as we have found the return to step 3 both of our fellow relegated clubs are in the relegation zone and so showing respect to clubs like our opponents today and last week who have both performed consistently well at this level is important.

Our sell-out crowd last week was a humbling level of support and the atmosphere was a big part of getting something out of that game so thank you for that support and I hope we can go one better today with a win.

Today will be another stern test against Folkestone but I'm sure with you all behind us like you do home and away week after week, we will get something from the game.

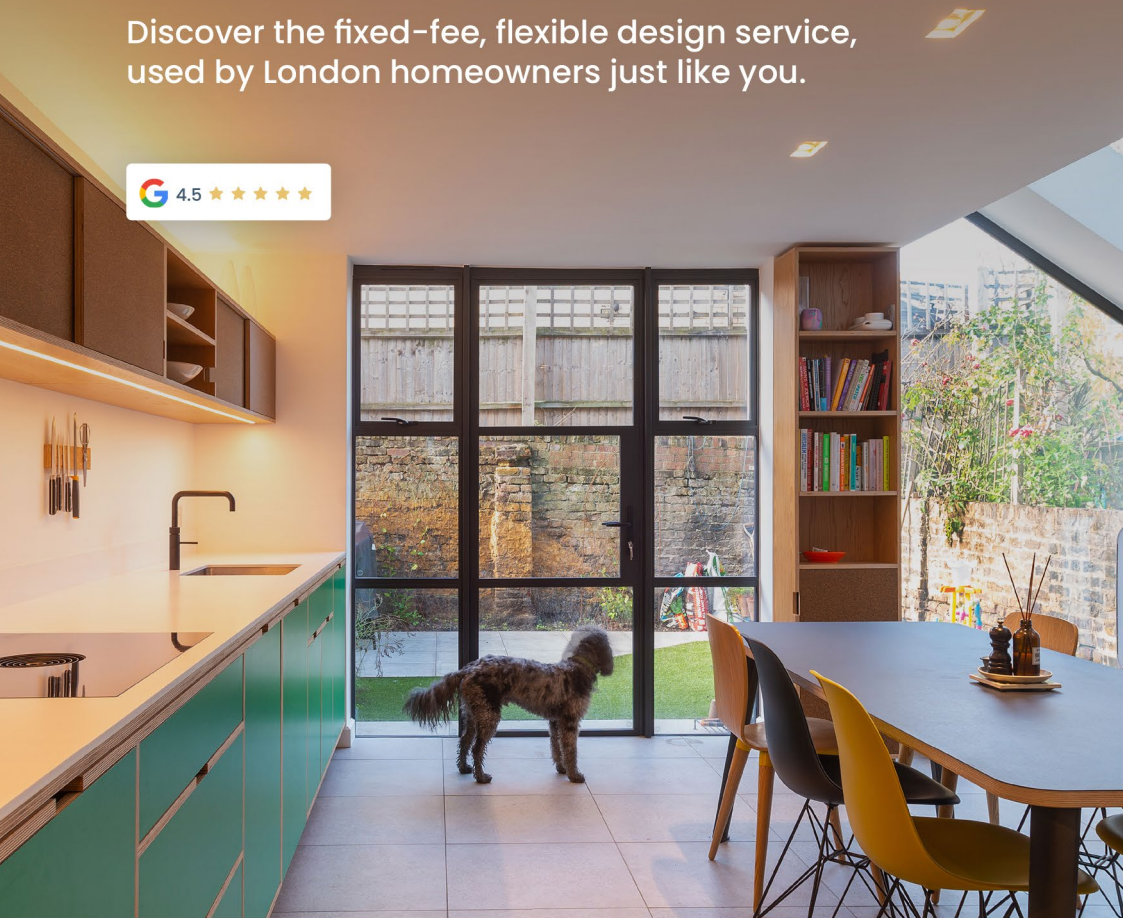

The Hamlet are back in the Isthmian League for the 2023-24 season for the first time since 2018 following five years in the National League South.

Those five seasons at Step 2 represented the highest level achieved during our 130-year history but ended in heartbreak on the final day of last season. Only needing a point to avoid the drop against Chippenham Town, the side would lose 1-0 in front of a sell-out 3,334 at Champion Hill, with other results elsewhere condemning us to relegation.

The club with the famous pink and blue shirts can boast an illustrious past as a giant of the amateur game. Our story began back in 1893. During that summer, Lorraine 'Pa' Wilson was handed a sum of one shilling and eight pence by a couple of keen young footballers and asked to start a Dulwich Hamlet Football Club. He tackled the task with great relish and over the next thirty years, helped to build Dulwich into a powerful force.

The early days were tough. The club's original ground in Woodwarde Road had no changing facilities. On match days the players used to walk half a mile to get from their dressing room to the pitch, often carrying the goalposts, crossbars, and corner flags with them.

Dulwich made their competitive debut when they joined the Camberwell League in 1894-95.

The following season the championship of that league's 'B' Division became the first entry in our honours list. After achieving senior status in 1900, we won our first Surrey Senior Cup in 1905, and still hold the competition record with 16 wins, most recently in 1975. In 1907, Dulwich gained election to the Isthmian League.

During the First World War, the legendary Edgar Kail joined Dulwich. In his fourteen-year career, Kail scored 427 goals, and played three times for the full England side, scoring twice on his debut against France. Kail helped Dulwich to league titles in 1920, 1926 and 1933, two FA Amateur Cup triumphs in 1920 and 1932, and the London Senior Cup in 1925. Another Hamlet legend of that era was goalkeeper Bert Coleman who gained a full England cap in 1921, keeping a clean sheet against Wales. Dulwich's other major successes between the wars were further Amateur Cup wins in 1934 and 1937, and another London Senior Cup victory in 1939.

Dulwich were quickly into their stride post-war and in 1949 they were Isthmian League champions for a fourth time. In 1950 they lifted the London Senior Cup again. One of the most popular players of the period was left-winger Tommy Jover whose career goals tally for Dulwich has only been bettered by Kail. Tommy completed more than seventy years service as player, official and President from 1985 until his death in 2008. The club's main stand is named in his honour.

Dulwich went through a lean spell during the 1960s and 70s, culminating in relegation from the top division. However, they bounced straight back under manager Alan Smith, winning the Division One championship at the first attempt in 1978.

Since the phasing out of amateur football in the 1970s, Dulwich have been semi-professional and compete in the FA Trophy. Their best run so far in the competition was in 1979-80 when they reached the quarter-finals, this was repeated in 2016-17.

As the 1980s progressed, the club fell on hard times again and despite a London Senior Cup success in 1984 they struggled in the Isthmian League, being relegated to Division One in 1990. It took two years to return, an exciting finale to the 1991-92 campaign saw the Hamlet earn promotion on the final day of the season.

Dulwich were able to celebrate their centenary by moving into a new stadium. For a long time, our old ground was the mecca for amateur football, opening in 1931. In 1933, Kingstonian and Stockton played in a record-breaking 20,744-strong crowd for the FA Amateur Cup Final. Due to disrepair, the old ground had to be altered to satisfy safety regulations. In 1991, Sainsbury's redevelopment of the area demolished the stadium.

Frank Murphy transformed us into championship contenders again in the mid-1990s, before the decade ended with a run to the FA Cup First Round under Dave Garland. The club also lifted the London Challenge Cup in 1999, beating Uxbridge 2-1.

Relegation occurred again in 2001, which brought a long spell back in Division One. Promotion was almost regained under Martin Eede in 2004, however a 4-5 penalty loss to Wealdstone in a promotion play-off ended those dreams. Three days later, we beat Tooting & Mitcham United for our fifth and most recent London Senior Cup title.

Eede was succeeded first by Wayne Burnett and then Craig Edwards, before the arrival of former player Gavin Rose in the summer of 2009 as manager gave the club an upturn in fortunes. After a mid-table finish in his first year, he took the side to the Division One South play-off final in 2011, only to lose 4-3 to Leatherhead after extra time.

Rose would lose the final again 12 months later, but undeterred, 2012-13 would bring joy. Blending a mixture of experience with exciting youngsters, the Hamlet were involved in a scintillating title race with Maidstone United, with the season going to the final weekend. Against Burgess Hill Town at home, a second half strike from Xavier Vidal earned the point we needed to secure the title.

2017-18 brought more success, as we ended with a club-record 95 points in second place. This was made even more impressive by the fact that we had been evicted from Champion Hill that March, with home games at Tooting & Mitcham United. Leiston were beaten in the semi-final, before goalkeeper Amadou Tangara was the hero in the final, saving two Hendon penalties in the shootout after a 1-1 draw, with Dipo Akinyemi striking the winning spot-kick to send us to the National League South.

Life at Step 2 was a rollercoaster, with a 14th-placed finish in our first season. The following year brought an appearance in the FA Cup First Round, televised live on BBC1 against Carlisle United. 2021-22 brought us a 10th-placed finish, the highest position in the club's history.

Last season, the club parted company with Rose after 13 years in charge, with Paul Barnes replacing him. However, a loss of form in the spring saw another change, as Hakan Hayrettin came in, but despite keeping us in the running for survival, that defeat on the final day condemned us to the drop.

The club was established in 1936 and joined the East Kent Wednesday League for the 1936–37 season. They continued in the league until World War II.

In 1962 the club joined the new Division Two of the Eastern Section of the Kent County Amateur League. They won the division at the first attempt, earning promotion to Division One. The club were Division One champions in 1969–70 and were promoted to the Premier Division. However, they were relegated back to Division One at the end of the following season.

After finishing as runners-up in Division One in 1976–77, the club were promoted back to the Premier Division. Two seasons after being promoted, Invicta were champions of the Eastern Section Premier Division. In 1980–81 they were beaten 2–0 by New Romney in the final of the League Cup.

The Premier Division was renamed the Senior Division in 1984 and clubs in the division were granted 'Intermediate' status enabling them to enter a higher standard of county cup competition. The club were subsequently runners-up in the Kent Intermediate Shield in both the

1985–86 and 1989–90 seasons, losing 2–1 to Sevenoaks and 6–3 to Sangleigh Sports respectively.

Folkestone folded in 1990, with Invicta, now the highest-ranked club in the town, taking over their Cheriton Road the following year. In 1990–91 Invicta won the league's Les Leckie Cup (defeating Kennington in the final) and finished third in the Premier Division, after which they were elected to Division Two of the Kent League, which was largely composed of reserve teams. They went on to win the division, as well as the Division Two Cup and the Kent Intermediate Shield in the 1991–92 season, and were promoted to Division One, as well as being awarded senior status.

Their first spell in Division One saw them reach the final of the Kent Senior Trophy twice; in 1993–94 they lost 3–1 to Alma Swanley and in 1993–94 were beaten in a penalty shoot-out 5–4 by Deal Town.

The club were runners-up in Division One in 1997–98, earning promotion to the Southern Division of the Southern League, also losing another Kent Senior

Trophy final 1–0 to Greenwich Borough. After losing 1–0 to Welling United in the final of the Kent Senior Cup in 1998–99, the club were transferred to the Eastern Division for the 1999–2000 season. They went on to finish as runners-up in the division, earning promotion to the Premier Division. However, a second successive Kent Senior Cup final appearance that season ended in a 3–0 defeat by Gravesend & Northfleet.

Invicta spent three seasons in the Premier Division, before finishing bottom of the table in 2002–03, after which they were relegated to the Eastern Division. A fifth-place finish the following season was enough for an immediate promotion due to the creation of the Conference North and South creating several spaces in the divisions above. However, the club were transferred to the Isthmian League, joining its Premier Division. The 2003–04 season also saw another Kent Senior Cup final appearance, in which they were beaten 2–1 by Margate.

The following season striker Paul Sykes collapsed and died during a Senior Cup semi-final match against the same opponents, with the club withdrawing from the competition.

In 2005–06 Invicta reached the first round of the FA Cup for the first time, losing 2–1 at League Two Chester City. The club spent four seasons in the Isthmian League Premier Division before relegation to Division One South at the end of the 2008–09 season. In 2009–10 they were runners-up in Division One

South, having missed out on the title due to having ten points deducted for going into administration. However, they qualified for the promotion play-offs, and after beating Leatherhead on penalties in the semi-finals, defeated Godalming Town 2–1 in the final, earning promotion back to the Premier Division. Another Kent Senior Cup final appearance in the same season ended with a 3–1 defeat to Sittingbourne. In the following season the club finished bottom of the Premier Division and were relegated straight back to Division One South.

The next four seasons saw Invicta finish in the top five, qualifying for the promotion play-offs; in 2011–12 they lost 2–1 to Dulwich Hamlet in the semi-finals and in 2012–13 they lost at the same stage to Maidstone United. In 2013–14 they won their semi-final, beating Hastings United 3–2, but lost on penalties to Leatherhead in the final after a 1–1 draw. They reached the final again in 2014–15 after defeating Whyteleafe in the semi-finals, but were beaten 3–0 in the final by Merstham.

After four successive play-off failures, the club won Division One South in 2015–16 to return to the Premier Division. They finished fourth in the Premier Division in 2017–18, going on to lose 4–0 in the play-off semi-finals to Hendon. They also lost the Kent Senior Cup final again, beaten 4–2 on penalties by Maidstone United. A sixth Senior Cup final appearance in 2021–22 ended with a 6–2 defeat to Dartford.

He joined Folkestone Invicta in the summer of 2023 and scored a hat-trick in the opening day of the season in their 4-0 win against Wingate & Finchley in Isthmian Premier.

MATCH REPORT

HAMLET 2 MARGATE 2

Dulwich Hamlet secured a point in a closely contested 2-2 draw against Margate in dramatic late circumstances at Champion Hill on Saturday.

Josh Shonibare headed home his first goal for the club in the last minute of stoppage time to gain a valuable point for the home side.

The Hamlet came into the game looking to bounce back from a 3-2 defeat in the Velocity Trophy at the hands of Kingstonian on Tuesday, facing up against a Margate side who were unbeaten in their last two outings.

The first half began with Dulwich on top, stringing together some good football and exciting the home crowd. As the half went on, they began to turn their domination into chances. There was one man at the heart of everything though, and that was Anthony Jeffrey.

Hamlet's number ten began to terrorise the Margate defence, seeing a couple shots hit the side netting and having to watch a superb curling effort cannon back off the crossbar in the 36th minute.

The domination continued when just moments later Michael Chambers met with another good ball into the box, but his glancing header was cleared off the line. It was clear that it was now one way traffic.

Not long after, the boys in pink and blue finally got what they deserved. This came from a superb finish from that man Anthony Jeffrey, firing a perfect strike into the far corner to put the home side ahead in the 41st minute.

The second half began much more evenly contested with the visitors beginning to show what they could do. After dominating the first 15 minutes of the half, Margate were able to draw level in the 60th minute when Sam Blackman was found completely free at the back post.

As the second half progressed it began to get a bit scrappy, with lots of fouls and stoppages in play not allowing either side to get into their rhythm. Jeffrey managed to force a fantastic save out of the Margate goalkeeper but besides that chances were sparse for either side.

In the 90th minute of play Margate took the lead in what looked to be

heartbreaking circumstances for the home side, when Steve Cawley got on the end of a driven cross for the byline.

The Hamlet did not give up though. After giving everything they had to try and get an equaliser it came down to the last kick of the game, when Josh Shonibare became the hero sneaking onto a good cross at the back post to head home the equaliser.

Having come off the bench just 20 minutes before, it's safe to say he

won't be forgetting his home debut at Champion Hill anytime soon.

The point leaves Hamlet 16th in the table, just two points behind visitors Margate in 14th place. Anthony Jeffrey was the star performer on the day, in a good all-round performance gaining a well-deserved point at home.

The circumstances of the victory no doubt leaves Hakan Hayrettin's men in good spirits ahead of the visit of Folkestone Invicta next week at Champion Hill.

PROUD SUPPORTERS OF DULWICH HAMLET FC FOR OVER 20 YEARS

WILLIAM 'DUSTY' MILLER

William 'Dusty' Miller had a short but successful spell with Dulwich Hamlet, winning an Amateur Cup winners medal despite being in hospital for much of the match.

Dusty was born in Lewisham. His father in the police, serving at Lee Road Police Station. Hamlet probably first saw Dusty when he played for Athenian League Hayes in the Amateur Cup 3rd Round in February 1933. The teenage Dusty was a late selection. The match was abandoned during extra time. Hamlet's right half Cecil Murray played with influenza and collapsed unconscious. Hayes' captain Jack Maskell, brother of Dan, and Jimmy Harmsworth weren't match fit. Hamlet's Stan Smith didn't arrive from Hastings. C. Ede was announced as playing, he withdrew during the warmup leaving Hamlet with ten men until Stan's belated arrival. The match was abandoned at 1-1 after 115 minutes. Hamlet were indebted to Norman Cummings for an impressive goalkeeping display. Norman signed in 1932, after 1932 Amateur Cup winner Reg Miles departed for Catford Wanderers, remaining in situ until the arrival of Haydn Hill in 1937. Reg Miles also represented Aston Villa and Millwall as an amateur. Hayes scorer was Bill Caesar's brother and Hamlet old boy Eric, Dusty impressed. Hayes signed Dusty from Eltham based Kent Amateur

League Division One side Tilling's Athletic in 1931. Miller also represented Bromley Reserves in early 1931/32 and Division Two strugglers Charlton Athletic during 1932/33.

The replay at Champion Hill was watched by over 16,000 – the seventh biggest football crowd in England that day. Hamlet won 4-0 despite playing the first seven minutes with ten men, before Court entered the fray. Reserve teamers claimed all four, Court scored a hat trick, Ede the fourth. The match was halted for a while, the referee was knocked unconscious. Hamlet old boy Bert Gower served Hayes at the time. He moved to Uxbridge shortly after. He subsequently served Hayes and Uxbridge with distinction as an official.

Dusty signed for Hamlet in October 1933, with the rather daunting task of replacing the newly retired Edgar Kail.

He made his debut versus Nunhead. Shortly after Dusty was man of the match when Hamlet defeated Wycombe 1-0 to qualify for the F.A. Cup First Round Proper. He scored as Hamlet held Newport 2-2 in front of over 15,000 in the First Round, they deserved better but Emery was outstanding in goal for the visitors. The People noted Miller was a "decided acquisition." Hamlet fielded a weaker side for the Thursday replay due to work commitments, Miller moved from outside left to inside right to

replace. C. Ede. Unsurprisingly Hamlet lost.

The First Round Proper of the Amateur Cup saw Hamlet defeat Finchley 2-1 at Champion Hill. Dusty scored the opener. Boxing Day saw him representing the Isthmian League versus Corinthians, at Wimbledon. January saw Hamlet defeat Athenian League side Walthamstow Avenue 3-2 in the Second Round of the Amateur Cup. 10,000 watched at Champion Hill, the media hailed the Cecil Murray – Miller partnership.

The 3rd Round saw a 3-1 win at Sutton United. Sutton dominated for the first twenty minutes and took a deserved lead before Robbins (penalty), Goodliffe and Murray secured the win. In the 4th Round Hamlet defeated Casuals 2-1 in front of 7,000 at Kingston. Court and Goodliffe scored in the first half. Whilst Casuals had the better of the second half good defence restricted them to one goal. Bernard Joy was one of nine Corinthians to represent Casuals.

In March Hamlet defeated Metropolitan Police 2-0 at Wimbledon in the Amateur Cup Semi Final, watched by over 15,000. The media agreed Miller was man of the match, W.G. Goodliffe scored both goals. The sides returned to Wimbledon the following week for the Surrey Senior Cup Semi Final, which was drawn 2-2. The Police were the trophy holders. Hamlet won the replay 3-1 at Nunhead, Miller scored after Benka scored a brace. Hamlet met Wimbledon in the Final, drawing 0-0 after extra time at Champion Hill before 5-2 in the replay

at Plough Lane with Dusty playing well. Court was booed by Dons fans when collecting his medal, they thought his rough play crossed the line. Hamlet were also Isthmian League runners up.

The Amateur Cup Final was held at Upton Park on May 20th, Hamlet secured a famous 2-1 victory. At the end Hamlet had eight fit men, two swathed in bandages and Dusty in hospital with concussion. Fifteen minutes in Dusty and Benka clashed heads. Both retired for treatment, Benka returned, Dusty was admitted to East Ham Hospital. Before half time Toser and Leyton player Boatwright collided, leaving them with bandaged heads too. Leyton player Coates was all but a passenger for the last few minutes too.

Athenian League Leyton should have won, wasting good opportunities but Hamlet hung on in there and opened the scoring in the second half when Robbins fired home a free kick reputedly from around 40 yards. A slip by Hugo saw Davis equalise and Leyton pressed for the winner. Instead, Hamlet broke Benka swung the ball to Court, he shot and is widely agreed to have scored however Benka made sure the ball was clearly in the net to secure an incredible victory, watched by 34,000. Dulwich became the first team to win their first three Amateur Cup finals.

Hugo, Murray, Morrish, Goodliffe were ex juniors. Robbins, Toser and

Court hadn't played senior football for anyone else. Hamer joined from London Welsh and Swansea Amateurs in 1926, Cummings from Northfleet and Benka from Norsemen and Casuals, both in 1932. Miller was the only newcomer.

Dusty commenced 1934/35 with Hamlet but wasn't a regular. In mid-February 1935 Hamlet accepted his resignation to play for Wimbledon "with regret." The Isthmian League Council refused to register him for six weeks, Dusty played for Dons and Millwall Reserves. The league relented, allowing Dusty to score against Hamlet in a 1-1 draw in April. He subsequently moved to Sutton United, playing alongside his brother.

Dusty left Sutton and resigned his job to join Islington Corinthians seven months, 95 game world tour covering 14 countries. The tour started in October 1937, the last match was played on May 27th 1938. The tourists won 65 games, losing 8 and were watched by around a million people. The nineteen-player touring party was shot at by the British army at the Khyber Pass, charged by an elephant, chased by a jaguar, arrived in China during the Sino Japanese war, nearly arrested by the occupying forces for breaching a curfew, the first British team to play in Japan, surfed in Hawaii, met royalty and partied with Hollywood stars.

On returning to London Dusty moved in with his parents at Catford, asked by the media what he wanted to do next he replied to find a job. His next footballing destination seems to have been St Albans. Like many players he

lost the best years of his career to war, during which he was held prisoner of war. Sources suggest he played for Carlisle; we cannot find proof so suspect these were wartime matches prior to deploying.

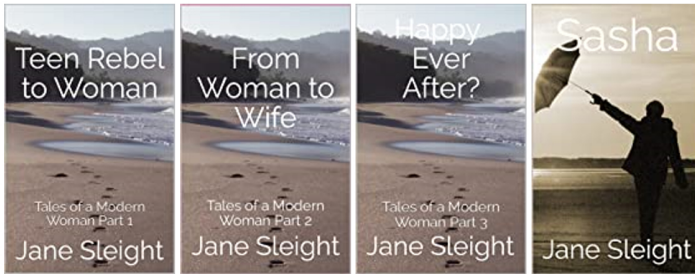
Post war Dusty returned to St Alban, reportedly in surprisingly good shape given what he endured. Dusty retired but came out of retirement to assist Leyton in 1949, being appointed trainer. In 1950/51 he was manager at London League Beckenham. They were in their first season as a formal nursery team for Crystal Palace, Palace sent them amateurs to develop and allowed them to train at Selhurst Park. Pat Saward, one of the amateurs Dusty persuaded to sign, credited him with changing his life. Pat didn't think he was good enough for Beckenham but went on to win the F.A. Cup with Aston Villa and represented Eire.

He is probably best remembered today as the man replaced as Brighton's manager by Brian Clough. It seems Beckenham was Dusty's last role, he then vanishes.

Curiously Eric Caesar played in the Amateur Cup Final for Leyton against Hamlet whilst Bill Caesar played for Hayes in the 1931 Amateur Cup Final, conceding the decisive penalty. He is also in Wisden. Bill made a first-class appearance for Surrey in 1922, his next first-class appearance was for Somerset in 1946, the second longest gap in first class history.

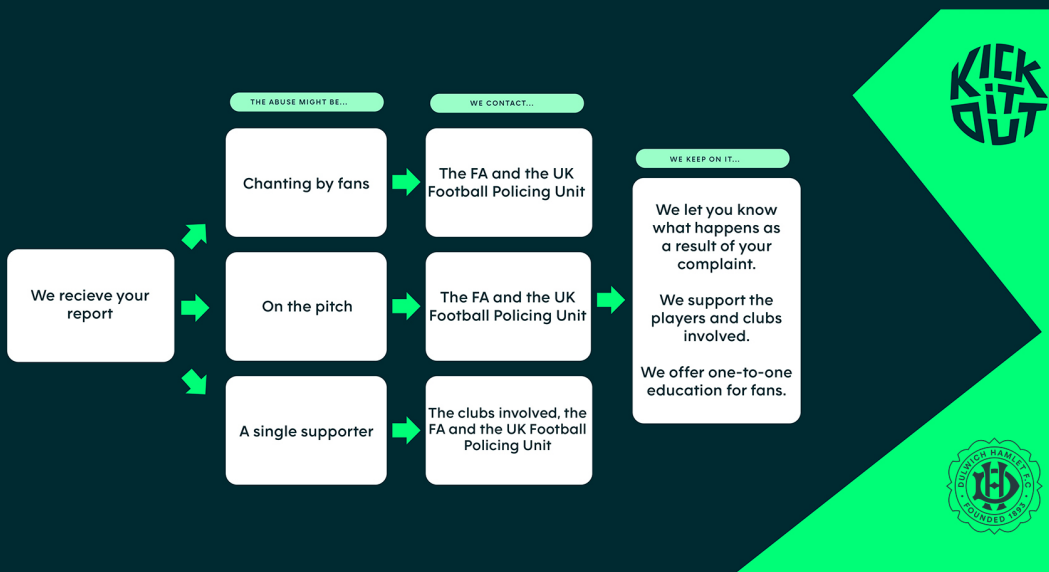

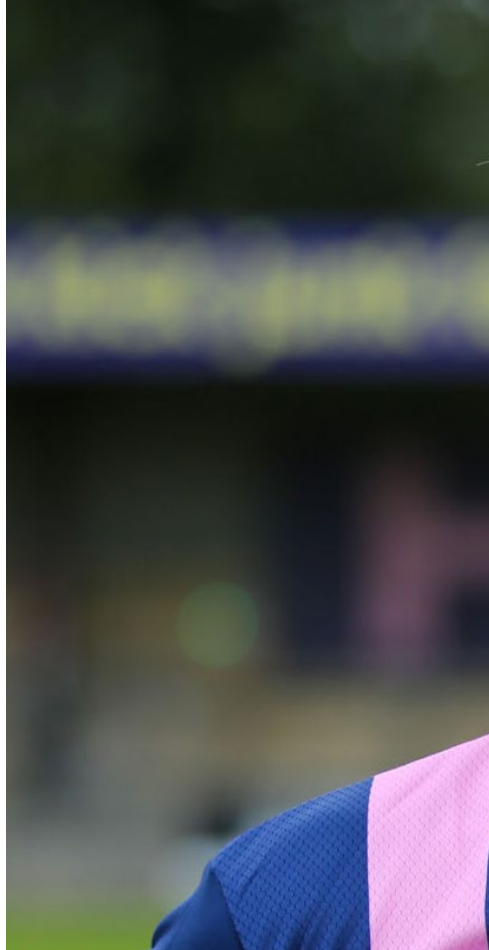

One swallow doesn't make a summer, but that was very good. A totally different level of performance to the one we put in against Grays. We looked far more lethal going forward (without Carew, ahem) and moved the ball with far more zip.

It'll take several more performances like this for me to think we're addressing the problems that have plagued us for the last four seasons but it's a good foundation on which to build. Neil Cugley (Folkestone's manager) has been around for years and knows how to assemble a solid side on a shoestring budget, so to get six goals past him is a decent achievement.

Nonetheless, Folkestone made things very easy for us: their backline was so flat we could slip balls in behind with ease which played in to the hands of the very mobile quartet of Clunis, Carr, Daniel and Tomlin.

Our backline still looks fragile and Chambers looks bereft of confidence, which is a real shame particularly when you know that he is a very capable and classy player. Preston made three good saves to keep Folkestone at bay and they'll be disappointed that they didn't score more than one. Room for improvement here, but it was such a relief to see us attacking with so much more gusto and threat that I don't really care.

Kevin James clearly makes a massive difference, mainly I think, through his drill sergeant vocality and the ball seems to get moved much quicker when he's on the pitch. With Kargbo seemingly out for a long time, James is going to be vital in the meantime.

More of the same please! More shots, more forward runs, quicker movement of the ball! Tuesday has suddenly become a very interesting fixture.

- b. Using obscene or abusive language, or persistent swearing.
- c. Being drunk or under the influence of drugs.
- d. Making vulgar gestures.
- e. Making racial gestures.
- f. Racist, sexist, homophobic, transphobic or discriminatory abuse, chanting or harassment.
- g. Interfering with the comfort, enjoyment or safety of others.
- h. Impeding the normal activities of the Club, its staff and officers.
- i. Bringing the Club into disrepute by any means.

3. The following articles must not be brought within the Ground – knives, fireworks, smoke canisters, air-horns, flares, weapons, dangerous or hazardous items, laser devices, bottles, glass vessels, cans, poles and any article that might be used as a weapon and/or compromise public safety. Any person in possession of such items will be refused entry to the Ground. Furthermore, the following are strictly forbidden:

- a. The consumption of alcohol in bottles, glasses and metal cans within the stand, terraces and other open areas of

the ground.

- b. The climbing up onto floodlights, stands, building, roofs or structures, fences and the like.
- c. The throwing of any missile, object or projectile.
- d. The blocking of walkways and pedestrian routes by any means.
- e. The playing of ball games adjacent to all buildings and/or areas populated by visitors to the Ground.
- f. Allowing any animal to roam off the leash within the ground boundaries.

4. All vehicles parked within the Club's designated boundaries are left at the owners' risk. There is no designated football only parking adjacent to the Ground.

At all times whilst present in the Ground, persons must comply with all instructions of any steward or officer of the Club and/or any police officer. Failure to comply with any instruction may lead to immediate ejection from the Ground.

In the event of the postponement or abandonment of the Match, refunds (if any) will be made in accordance with the Isthmian Football League rules. The Club will have no further liability whatsoever, including (but not limited to) any indirect or consequential loss or damage, such as (but not limited to) loss of enjoyment or travel costs.

The Club reserves the right to alter/amend/update these regulations as necessary and will inform all concerned through the normal communication routes.
